Answer Sheets

Category: Optimizing Speaking

Time: 25+ minutes

Requirements:

- 1. Copies of worksheet (below)
- 2. Copies of the answer sheet (below)
- 3. 10+ participants

Description: Going over answers in class can sometimes be a struggle. Here, you will get an idea of how promoting students to become the 'teacher' in class is an effective way to maximize participation and boost student-centeredness.

Objectives: Participants will be able to...

- 1. Lead a group for checking answers
- 2. Compare answers on the given task

Pre-Activity

- 1. Have each participant complete the **Trivia 101** worksheet below. It should take just about five minutes. Instruct participants to not use the internet.
 - Questions and answers are found <u>here</u>. I'll also have an answer sheet provided below.

Activity Steps

- 2. After all participants have finished with the worksheet, explain to the participants that they will get into groups to share their answers with each other. Also explain that you have answer sheets in which you will share with them. The answers will be divided among the group, giving each participant at least two answers (in the form of paper strips) for the worksheet.
 - **IMPORTANT:** Some answer sheets will have questions below them to encourage conversation VS just going over answers. Other answer strips will prompt participants to make their own discussion question. *If participants do not like the discussion question given to them, they are more than welcome to make their own.
- 3. Group participants into threes or fours. Have participants share their answers in their groups. Encourage conversation.

4. After about 1-2 minutes of sharing answers, call attention to yourself. Explain that you will give at least two answer strips to each participant per group. As long as the group as a whole gets all answers for the worksheet, it is okay if some participants have more answer strips than others. For the activity to go smoothly, it might be wise to give each participant in a group answer strips that are back-to-back with the order of the questions. For example, Group 1:

Participant 1 = answer strips for questions 1-3

Participant 2 = answer strips for questions 4-6

Participant 3 = answer strips for questions 7-10

- 5. As you distribute the answer strips, remind participants that some answer strips have extra information that they should share with their group.
- 6. After distributing the answer strips, groups may start checking answers. Allow at least 10 minutes. It is okay to extend time if needed.
- 7. Float around the room and assist as needed until time is up or all groups have finished.
- 8. Check answers quickly as a class.

Post-Activity: Discussion Questions

In groups, discuss:

- 1. How might this activity be helpful for Japanese ELs?
- Would you say this activity is more teacher-centered or student-centered? Why?
- 3. What might be some potential problems with this activity? How would you tweak the activity to accommodate for those problems?

Activity Rationale

For beginning level Japanese ELs, modeling the activity and providing a guide sheet for instructional language would be helpful.
